

One of the world's foremost authorities on the African elephant, Iain Douglas-Hamilton made the first in-depth scientific study of elephant social behavior in Tanzania's Lake Manyara National Park, aged 23. During the 1970's he investigated the status of elephants and alerted the world to the ivory poaching holocaust. He chronicled how Africa's elephant population was halved between 1979 and 1989 and helped bring about the world ivory trade ban. Iain serves on the data review task force of the African Elephant Specialist Group of IUCN and the Technical Advisory Group for MIKE. As well as managing STE's various scientific programs, he conducts regular lecture tours and works with the media to promote STE's mission and awareness of elephants in general.
